

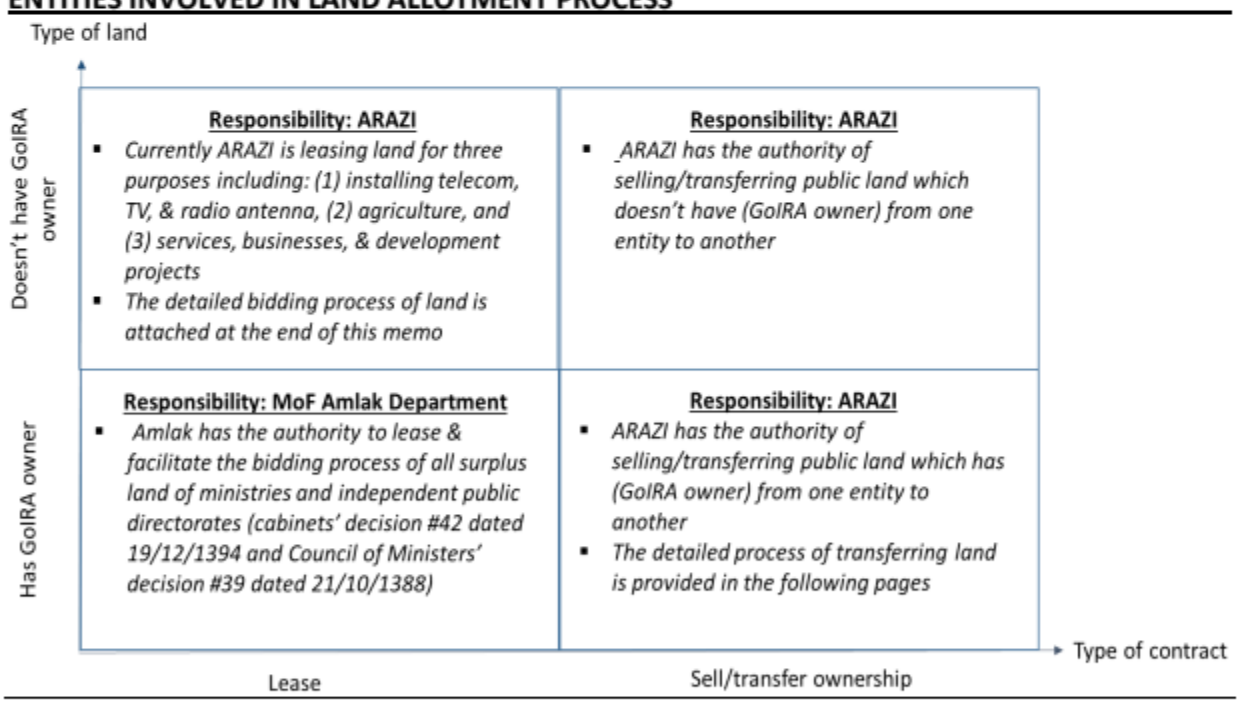
Land Allotment Process For Investors

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY
Currently, three public entities are involved in the allotment process of land in Afghanistan
including: (1) ARAZI, (2) Amlak Department of MoF, and (3) Kabul Municipality. ARAZI is in charge of all public lands (without a GoIRA owner) in Afghanistan. Currently ARAZI leases land for three purposes: (1) installing telecom, TV, & radio antenna, (2) agricultural purposes, and (3) for services, businesses, & development projects.

The Amlak Department of MoF is in charge of leasing the land of ministries and all public independent authorities. As per (Cabinet decision, #42 dated 19/12/1394 & Council of Ministers' decision #39 dated 21/10/1388), all ministerial and independent public directorate leasing authority was transferred to the MoF (Amlak Department) except Tasadees' land.

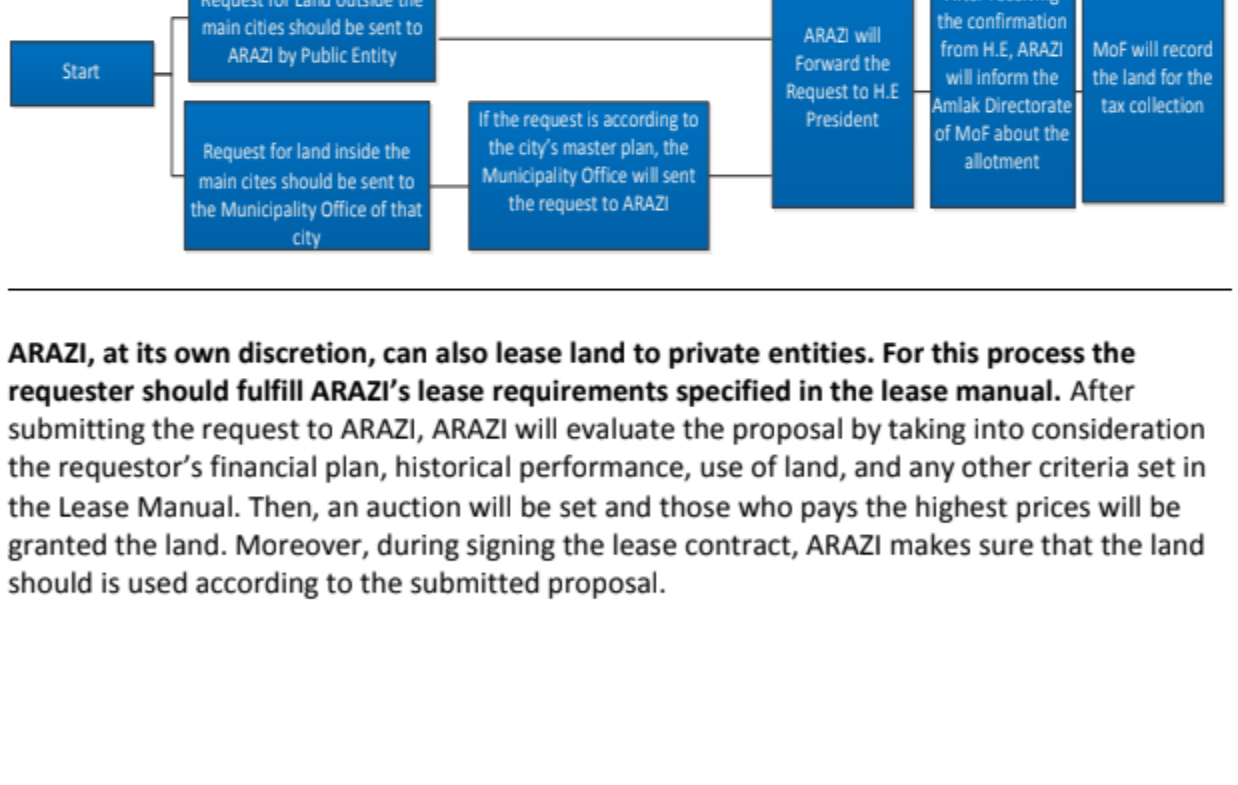
However, after Council of Ministers' decision #39 dated 21/10/1388, Kabul Municipality also received permission from MoF (#4268, dated 10/9/1392) to lease some of its lands independently. However, on the rest of Kabul Municipality's lands the cabinet decision #39 dated 21/10/1388 is enforceable. The following chart will summarize the bidding process of land in Afghanistan.



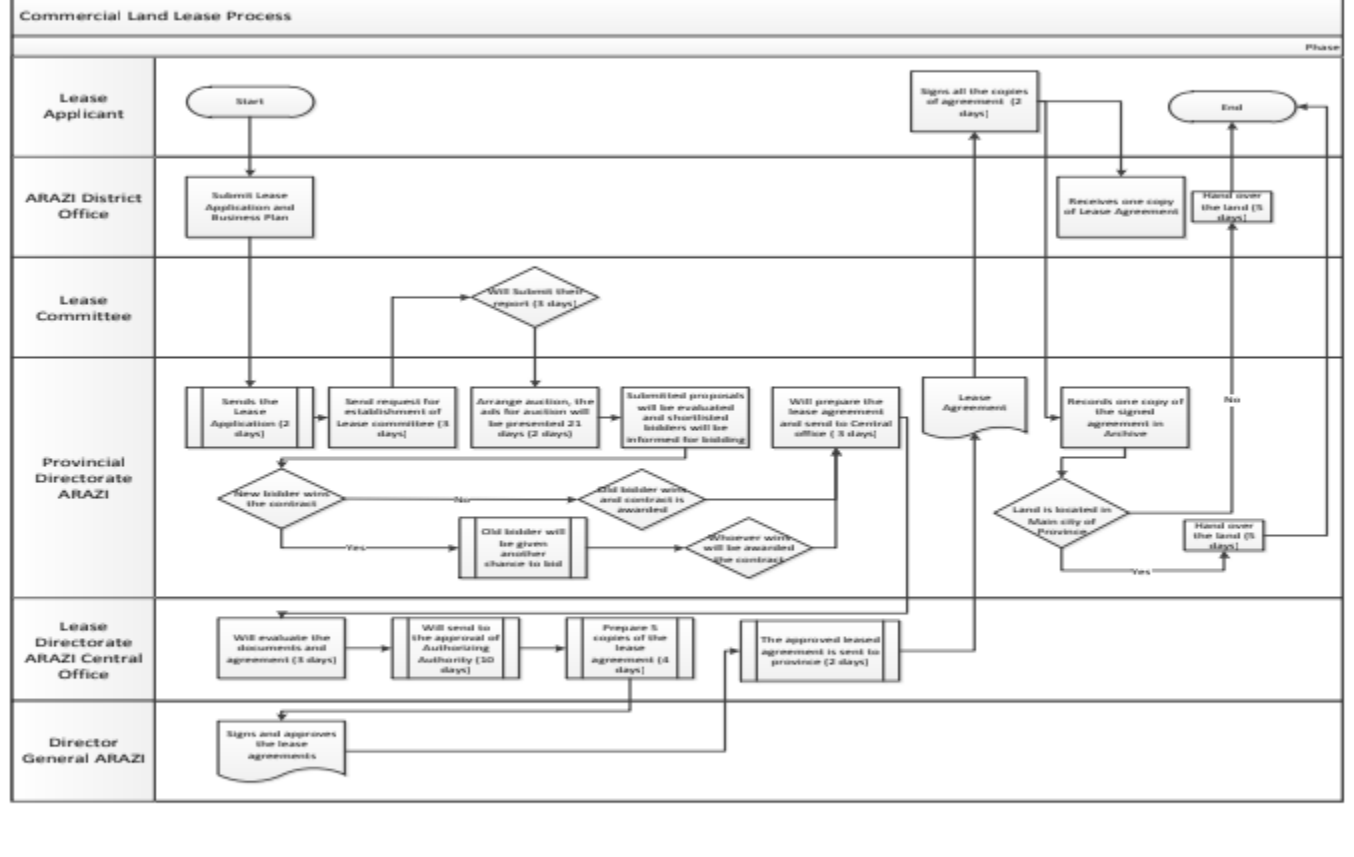
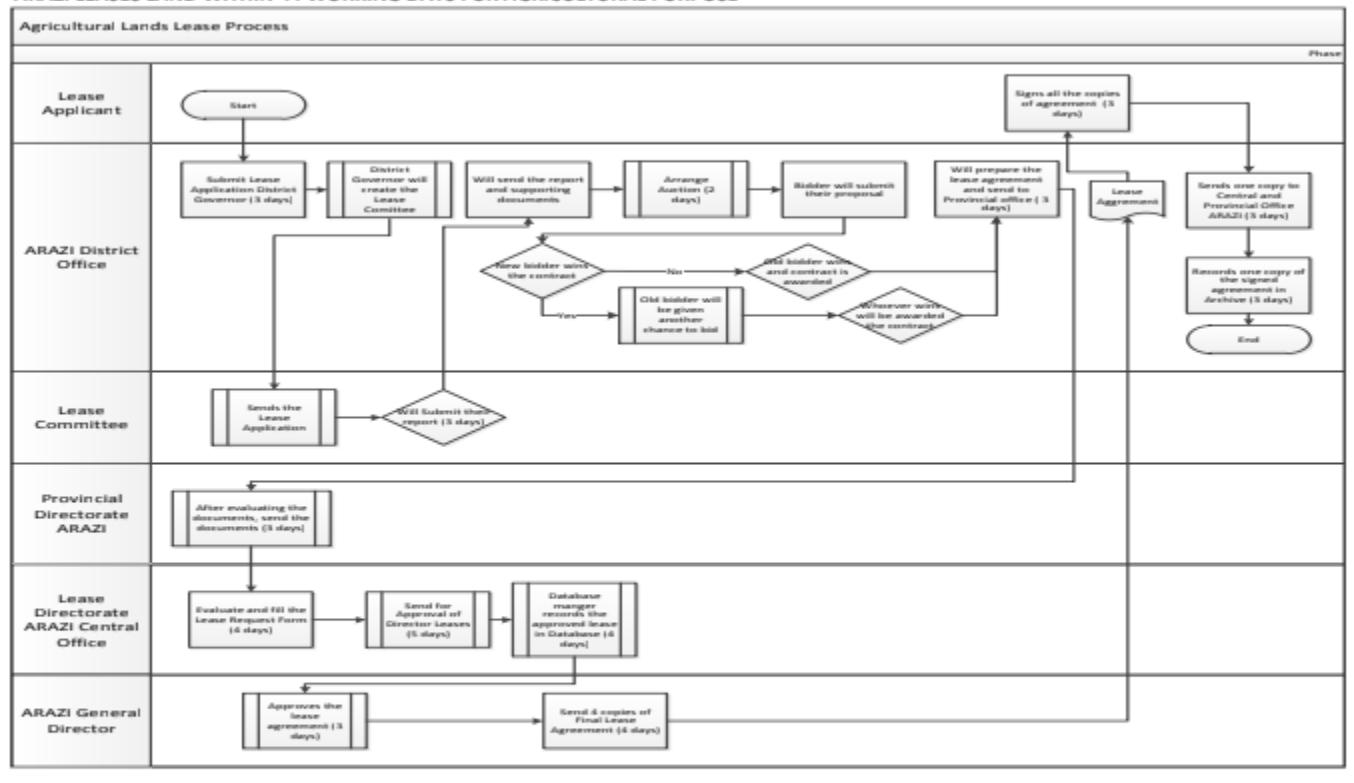
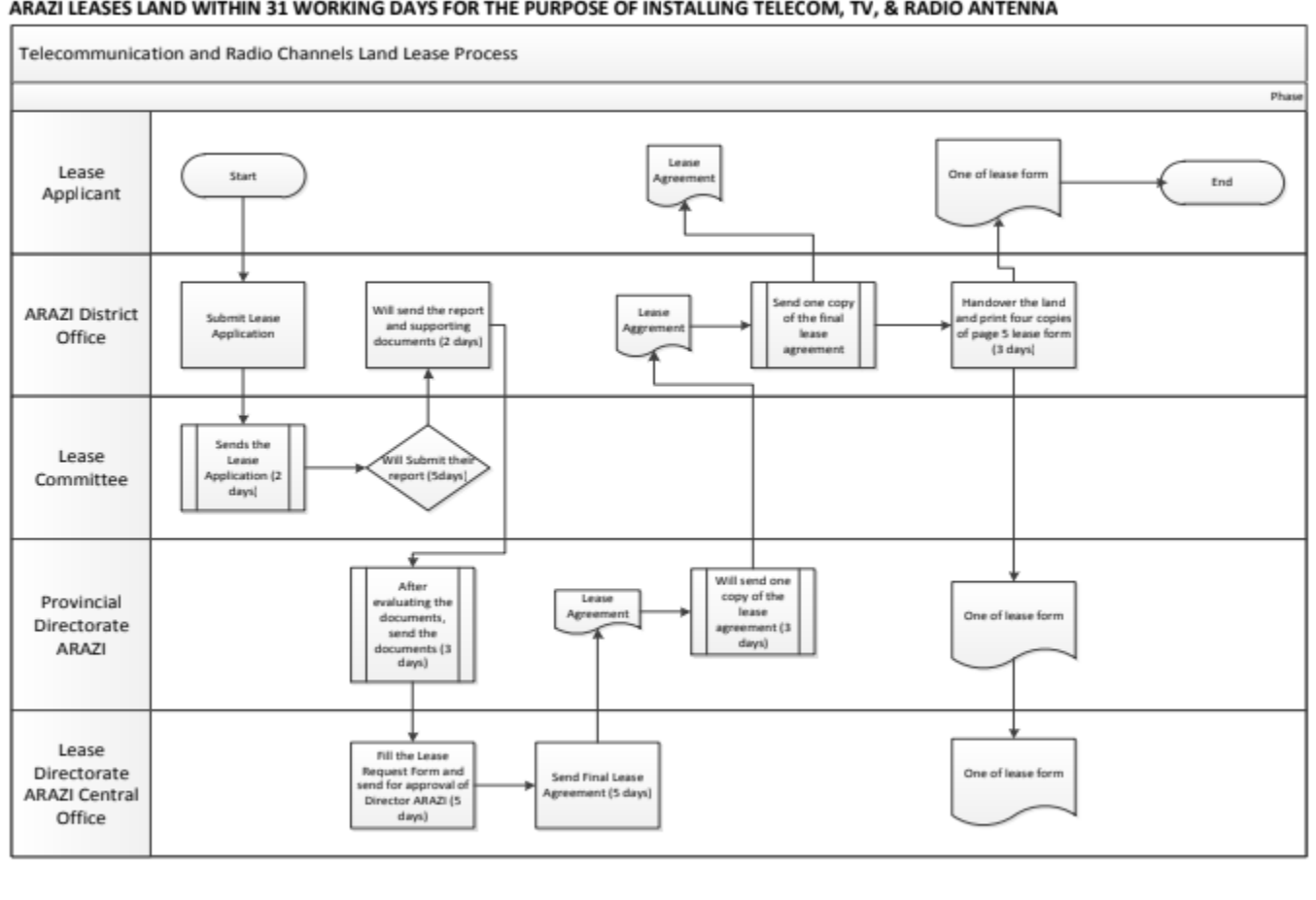
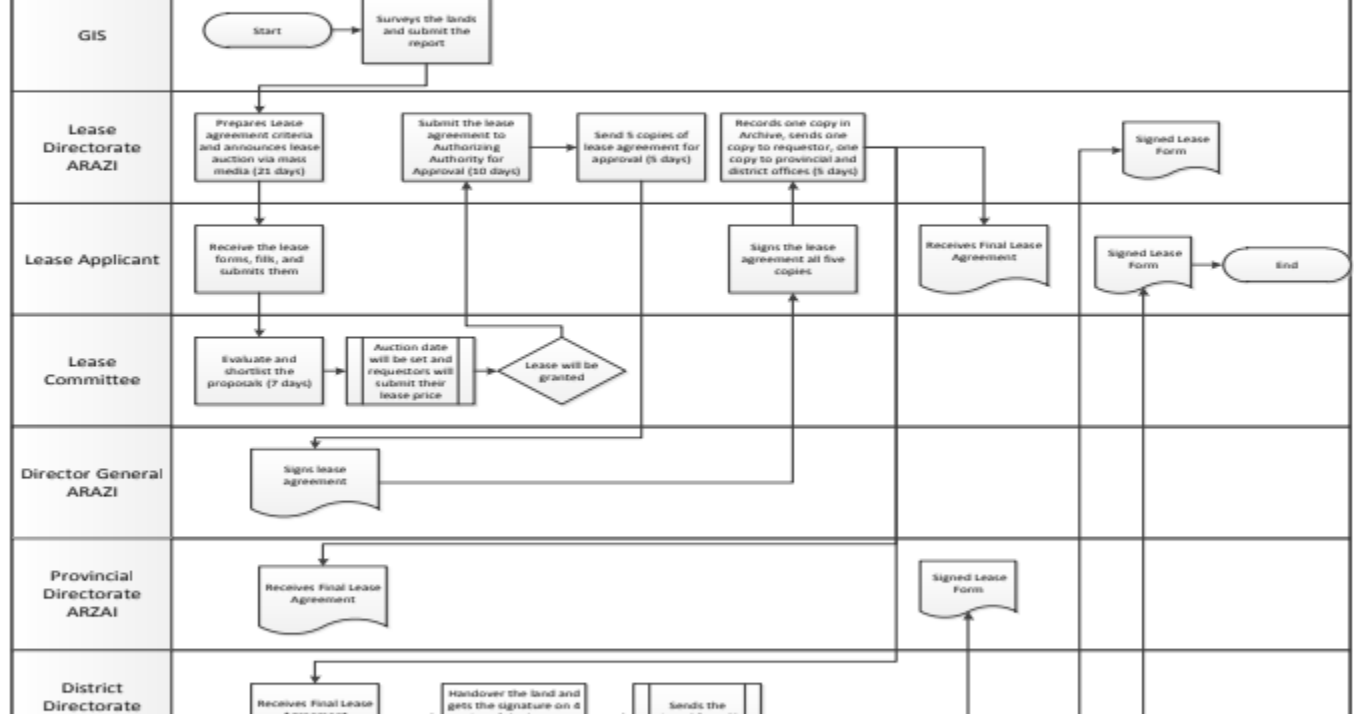
ARAZI LAND ALLOCATION PROCESS FLOW
In this section, we will present the current land allotment process of ARAZI. ARAZI, as an independent authority, is the owner of all public (governmental) lands throughout Afghanistan. The land allocation process is different for public and private sector. Currently ARAZI is leasing land for three purposes including: (1) installing telecom, TV, & radio antenna, (2) agricultural purposes, and (3) for services, businesses, & development projects.

For sale of public land, the process starts with the request of ministry or any other government institution. If the requested land is inside the urban area (city), then the requestor is also required to send his/her request via an official maktoob to the Municipality office of that city (in the case of this report, it is Kabul Municipality). The municipality reviews whether the requested land location is according to city's master plan. If the requested land location is according to the city master plan, the municipality will give its approval to ARAZI via maktoob. After that ARAZI will send a Peshnehad to H.E the President for receiving approval. After receiving H.E's confirmation, ARAZI will transfer the land the new owner and inform the Amlak (املاک) Department of MoF to register the land under the supervision of that requestor.

However, if the requested land is outside of the urban area, the requestor only send his/her request via an official Maktoob directly to the ARAZI without involving the Municipality office.



ARAZI, at its own discretion, can also lease land to private entities. For this process the requestor should fulfill ARAZI's lease requirements specified in the lease manual. After submitting the request to ARAZI, ARAZI will evaluate the proposal by taking into consideration the requestor's financial plan, historical performance, use of land, and any other criteria set in the Lease Manual. Then, an auction will be set and those who pays the highest prices will be granted the land. Moreover, during signing the lease contract, ARAZI makes sure that the land should be used according to the submitted proposal.



AMLAK LAND ALLOCATION PROCESS
Amlak's land allocation process starts by preparing a property condition document (according to Procurement law article #30), which is then sent to Minister of Finance for approval. Upon his approval, Amlak announces the surplus land which is put into auction at MoF website & Afghan Elnat for 21 days. Businessmen can then submit their proposals. The MoF contract audit department then reviews all proposals to evaluate whether they are according to the established conditions.

Afterwards, an auction committee comprised of Government Cases Directorate, Kabul Municipality, and General Revenue Department manages the auction process. Once the winner is identified, the contract is sent to Minister of Finance for approval. Upon his approval, the contract is registered and the property is transferred to the bid winner.
